



Children Adopted from Care and Special Guardianship Orders




Under 5s Entrance into the Care System and Looked After Children

Modernising "Permanence" for children from care

- 2/3 of children made subject of adoption or special guardianship orders have additional or complex needs (Selwyn, et al)
- Local Authorities (LAs) are required to assess their needs, make a plan and provide support services for these children
- LAs are required each year to publish a plan describing these support arrangements
- It is likely that you place the majority of these children outside your LA.
- After 3 years the support becomes the responsibility of the LA where the child lives




